Freshly ground beans, straightforward advice and (if you can't wait until you get home) a coffee to go, made by a fine barista: El Magnifico is the real deal in coffee expertise. Prefer tea? They sell that too. The large cookies they keep enticingly close to the counter are a must.

It's a wink at the customers: Satan's Coffee Corner is about the content, not about the bow people can put around things. Lunch and breakfast suggestions are carefully rhymed with coffee types. Also sells an interesting collection of magazines.

Caelum Bakery sells pastries and cookies made by monks and nuns in Catalanian monasteries, and the adjoining coffee shop adds caffeine to that (already very convincing) offer. If you haven't reached heaven (*caelum*) by then, you can choose one of various liqueurs. Pick up a jar of artisan jam on the way out.

99 MESÓN DEL CAFÉ 1909

Mesón del Café goes for a laidback approach. The interior basically hasn't been touched since 1909 and the coffee machine is supposed to be the oldest in town. It looks surprisingly like a German beer bar, but if you can get over the culture shock, you'll notice they do make a wicked cup of coffee.

Have a *dulce de leche* cookie to go with your coffee and pick up a copy of *Syrazine*, Syra Coffee's bi-monthly fanzine with coffee facts and illustrations by local artists.

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5 stunning MODERNIST MARVELS

256 CASTELL DELS TRES DRAGONS

Nicknamed 'Castle of Three Dragons' after a 19th-century play, this is one of the first examples of Barcelona modernism, designed by architect Lluís Domènech i Montaner. It originally served as a restaurant, during the 1888 World Fair. Contemporary detractors claim that the stern, citadel-like exterior didn't fit the function of the building.

With two Gaudí buildings and dozens of high-end stores, it's not impossible to overlook the other marvels on Passeig de Gràcia. For starters: Casa Amatller. It was commissioned by the owner of a chocolate factory. References to his last name can be found on the façade: the initial A and almond tree branches (*amatller* is Catalan for 'almond tree').

436 BLACK SWAN HOSTEL

5 compelling URBAN LEGENDS

481 THE 33 SQUARE OF SAGRADA FAMÍLIA

Entering the Sagrada Família by the Passion Façade Gates, you'll notice a square, comprised of 16 boxes filled with numbers. The sum of all lines (horizontal, vertical and diagonal) equals 33. Since Gaudí was rumoured to be a freemason, many have related that number to the 33 degrees of initiation. However, the artwork isn't Gaudí's – it's by Josep Maria Subirachs, who designed this gate of the church – and the number 33 refers to Jesus' age when he died on the cross.

482 CARRER DEL BISBE BRIDGE

This bridge across Carrer del Bisbe features a sculpture of a crossed skull. Urban legend has it the city will crumble if the dagger is removed. The bridge was only constructed in the 1920s, by architect Joan Rubió i Bellver, who wanted to turn the Gothic neighbourhood into a Gothic theme park. The project was shelved; for a consolation prize, Rubió i Bellver got to design the bridge.
